Dear Chairwoman LaClair,

As part of the unique government-to-government relationship the US Government has with the Nooksack Tribe, we are contacting you as early as possible as we look to move forward with projects at the Lynden and Sumas LPOEs. On November 6, 2021, Congress passed the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL), which included funding for redevelopment of both LPOEs. A top priority for the LPOE program is to strengthen the government-to-government relationship with sovereign Tribal Nations. We understand that Tribal sovereignty and self-governance must be the cornerstones of federal Indian relations.

Both the Sumas and Lynden facilities were originally constructed in 1988 and do not adequately serve current demand. GSA proposes to replace the existing facilities to address multiple deficiencies and provide US Customs and Border Protection the opportunity to expand operations in future years. Given the close proximity and the similar timelines of the two projects, we have grouped them together for study purposes. Below we summarize previous cultural resource studies and outline the intended consultation efforts in compliance with cultural and environmental policies for this project. As we assess the timeline and next steps for this project, we wanted to give the Nooksack Tribe the opportunity to inform the Government if this process is sufficient or if further consultation or engagement efforts are desired.

Previous Cultural Resources Studies

GSA conducted background research within a half mile of the existing **Sumas** LPOE and found one previously recorded historic archaeological site. Seven cultural surveys were identified, one of which was conducted on the LPOE property (historic built-environment only). Six historic property inventories were identified within one half mile and one property listed in the National Register of Historic Places; the historic United States Border Station at Sumas. The Washington Department of Archaeology and Historic Preservation (DAHP) predictive model indicates a high probability for buried cultural resources within the vicinity.

GSA conducted background research within a half mile of the existing Lynden LPOE and found no previously recorded archaeology sites. Eleven cultural surveys were identified, three of which

were conducted on the LPOE property. There were also three historic property inventories located within one half mile to the south on Hwy 539. There are no properties listed in or determined eligible for the National Register of Historic Places within one half mile. The DAHP predictive model indicates a moderately low to moderate probability for buried cultural resources in the vicinity.

Area of Potential Effects and Studies

In January 2023 we will begin National Historic Preservation Act (NHPA) and National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) studies, which we expect will take approximately 18-24 months to complete. A cultural resource survey will be conducted to examine impacts to places and sites that are culturally significant to the community. Our planned NEPA analysis will result in an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS), which typically includes an assessment of potential impacts to the environment for the proposed alternatives.




Figure 2: Lynden Border Vidnity Map

Dear Chairwoman LaClair.

In December 2022 GSA sent a letter to inform you of our intent to expand the Land Port of Entry stations located in Lynden and Sumas, WA, and to invite you to consult on the projects. We did not receive a response to our letter; however, we realize it may not be possible or desirable to respond to each request. It is our intent to keep you informed of progress regarding cultural resource investigations at the sites. In accordance with 36 CFR 800.4 GSA has established the Area of Potential Effect (APE) for each site. The entire existing LPOE sites will be disturbed and the acquisition of property at each is anticipated. The APE for each includes all parcels that may be affected by ground disturbance. Given that the proposed outcome of the projects will not be a substantial change in size, context, use, or function, we propose to survey parcels upon which construction activities may occur. Initial survey activities will include literature review and an evaluation of standing structures. We do not anticipate subsurface testing at this time.

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


Figure 1: Lynden Border APE Map




Figure 2: Sumas Border APE Map

The U.S. General Services Administration (GSA) is proposing to develop the Land Port of Entry (LPOE) property at Sumas, WA. On November 6, 2021, Congress passed the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL), also known as the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA). On November 15, 2021, the President signed Executive Order (EO) 14052 "Implementation of the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act." Finally on December 13, 2021, the President signed EO 14508 "Transforming Federal Customer Experience and Service Delivery To Rebuild Trust in Government." On February 25, 2022, President Biden and GSA announced the list of major LPOE projects funded by the BIL. This list includes the Sumas LPOE.

GSA proposes to replace the existing LPOE facilities to address multiple deficiencies. In 2018, GSA and CBP completed a Feasibility Study to provide conceptual designs that intend to correct deficiencies at the property and bring the facilities up to LPOE Design Standards. The study identified a preferred alternative. GSA is currently undertaking a Program Development Study (PDS) to validate the preferred alternative and your office will be consulted as part of the study.

Previous Cultural Resources Studies

The buildings on the current Port property were constructed in 1990. GSA conducted background research within a half mile of the existing LPOE and found one previously recorded historic archaeological site. Seven cultural surveys were identified, one of which was conducted on the LPOE property (historic built-environment only (NADB 1351431); no archaeological survey has been conducted on the property). Six historic property inventories were identified within one half mile and one property listed in the National Register of Historic Places; the historic United States Border Station at Sumas. The DAHP predictive model indicates a high probability for buried cultural resources within the vicinity.

Area of Potential Effects and Studies




Figure 1: Sumas LPOE Vicinity Map

The APE has not been defined, but a vicinity map is provided below (Figure 1). The entire existing site will be disturbed and the acquisition of approximately six acres of commercial property to the south and east is anticipated. As identification of historic properties efforts commence under Section 106 and the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA), GSA and our NEPA Cultural Resources consultant will identify additional layers of APE, including but not

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limited to direct effects, visual effects, audible effects, and other indirect effects as part of their cultural resources reconnaissance and assessments. It is expected that NEPA studies will commence in early January, and a final Environmental Impact Statement will be completed and available for review in 2023-2024.

GSA has established that the project is an undertaking in accordance with 36 CFR 800, and invites you to participate in consultation. The Kenneth Ward Land Port of Entry, located in Lynden WA, serves the border communities of Lynden and Aldergrove, British Columbia. The Port currently operates 16-hrs a day, seven days a week, and processes POVs, buses, and pedestrians. The Port also processes a limited amount of commercial traffic under a pre-approved permit process. The US General Services Administration (GSA) proposes to expand the Port's operational efficiency and capability by adding additional POV and commercial lanes.




Figure 1: Lynden LPOE Vicinity Map

GSA has established that the project is an undertaking, as defined in 36 CFR 800.16(y), with the potential to affect historic properties, and invites you to participate in the consultation. The APE has not been defined, but a vicinity map is provided below (Figure 1). The majority of work will be conducted within the existing Port property, but expansion into the immediate surrounding area is also anticipated.

The buildings on the Port property were constructed in 1987. GSA conducted background research within a half mile of the existing LPOE and found no previously recorded archaeology sites. Eleven cultural surveys were identified, three of which were conducted on the LPOE property. There were also three historic property inventories located within one half mile to the south on Hwy 539. There are no properties listed in or determined eligible for the National Register of HIstoric Places within one half mile. The DAHP predictive model indicates a moderately low to moderate probability for buried cultural resources in the vicinity.

Simultaneous with this letter, GSA is reaching out to Indian Tribes and other parties who may be interested in this undertaking. We will also be conducting a combined Environmental Assessment for the Lynden and Sumas projects in accordance with the National Environmental Policy Act. 


Figure 1: Sumas LPOE APE

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


Figure 1: Lynden LPOE APE

The U.S. General Services Administration (GSA) Region 10 has prepared a Draft Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) to analyze the potential environmental impacts from the proposed expansion and modernization of the existing Kenneth G. Ward (Lynden) and Sumas Land Ports of Entry (LPOE) in Lynden and Sumas, Washington, in accordance with the requirements of the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 (NEPA) and the National Historic Preservation Act (NHPA). GSA is soliciting comments on the Draft EIS, which includes a Floodplain Assessment and Statement of Findings as an appendix.

The Lynden LPOE serves as the port of entry for people and vehicles connecting Lynden, Washington to Aldergrove, British Columbia, Canada. The Sumas LPOE serves as the port of entry for people and vehicles connecting Sumas, Washington to Abbotsford, British Columbia, Canada. The projects at the Lynden and Sumas LPOEs are analyzed jointly in the Draft EIS due to their proximity (approximately 10 miles) to one another. Operational changes at one of the LPOEs could have impacts on the other LPOE, especially during construction. The Draft EIS examines the impacts on human, natural, and cultural resources from potential improvements at the LPOEs, including site expansion, demolition, and new construction.

The purpose of these projects is for GSA to support the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's Customs and Border Protection (CBP) mission through modernizing and expanding the Lynden and Sumas LPOEs. Accomplishing this purpose would increase the functionality, capacity, operational efficiency, effectiveness, security, sustainability, and safety of the Lynden and Sumas LPOEs.

The Draft EIS considers two action alternatives for the Lynden LPOE, three action alternatives for the Sumas LPOE, and a "no action" alternative for each LPOE. The "no action" alternative assumes that GSA would not expand or modernize the Lynden or Sumas LPOEs and that operations would continue under the current conditions.

At the Lynden LPOE, GSA proposes to construct a Main Building and Head House, a non-intrusive inspection building, commercial inspection yard, inspection booths/canopies, staff/visitor parking, inbound and outbound inspection areas, and utility facilities, as needed. The two action alternatives differ in the direction of the LPOE expansion and the maximum proposed limit of disturbance. The option to expand the LPOE to the west and east would disturb a maximum area of approximately 14.5 acres. The other action alternative would expand the LPOE to the north and south and would impact a maximum of approximately 10.3 acres.

At the Sumas LPOE, GSA proposes to construct a Main Building, a non-intrusive inspection building, inspection booths/canopies, inbound and outbound inspection areas, hazardous materials and agriculture inspection platforms, stormwater detention area, outdoor parking and staging areas, and utility facilities, as needed. The three action alternatives differ in the potential siting of inspection facilities and construction

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of a single or multi-story port building. The proposed maximum extent of disturbance under any of the Sumas action alternatives is approximately 12.9 acres.

Two construction sequencing options were considered in the Draft EIS; these options are independent of the action alternatives and could be implemented with any of the action alternatives. Under the Concurrent Construction option, both ports would remain open during construction. Under the Sequential Construction option, GSA and CBP are considering the potential for a temporary closure of the Lynden LPOE. Additional details on the alternatives and the construction sequencing options being considered are provided in the Draft EIS.

The Draft EIS addresses the potential environmental impacts of the proposed alternatives on environmental resources including land use; water resources; biological resources; geology, topography, and soils; air quality, climate change, and greenhouse gases; human health and safety; infrastructure and utilities; traffic and transportation; noise and vibration; socioeconomics; and environmental justice and protection of children's health and safety. Based on the analysis presented in the Draft EIS, impacts to all resource areas would be less than significant (i.e., negligible, minor, or moderate). Impact reduction measures are presented in the Draft EIS to reduce potential adverse effects.

The Sumas LPOE project area is located within the 1-percent-annual-chance floodplain (also referred to as the base flood or 100-year flood) and 0.2-percent-annual-chance floodplain (also referred to as the 500-year flood). In compliance with Executive Order 11988 (Floodplain Management), GSA prepared a Floodplain Assessment and Statement of Findings, addressing potential impacts on floodplains, which is included in the Draft EIS for public review and comment. As described in the Draft EIS, GSA would follow federal, state, and local regulatory compliance requirements and incorporate design standards at the Sumas LPOE to minimize impacts to floodplains.

The public is encouraged to attend and participate in an in-person, open house public hearing to be held on September 4, 2024, from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m. PT. The purpose of this hearing is to present the findings of the Draft EIS to the public and to solicit feedback on the analysis. The hearing will be held at the American Legion Post 212 building at 134 Harrison St, Sumas, WA, 98295.

The U.S. General Services Administration (GSA) Region 10 has prepared a Draft Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) to analyze the potential environmental impacts from the proposed expansion and modernization of the existing Kenneth G. Ward (Lynden) and Sumas Land Ports of Entry (LPOE) in Lynden and Sumas, Washington, in accordance with the requirements of the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 (NEPA) and the National Historic Preservation Act (NHPA). GSA is soliciting comments on the Draft EIS, which includes a Floodplain Assessment and Statement of Findings as an appendix.

The Lynden LPOE serves as the port of entry for people and vehicles connecting Lynden, Washington to Aldergrove, British Columbia, Canada. The Sumas LPOE serves as the port of entry for people and vehicles connecting Sumas, Washington to Abbotsford, British Columbia, Canada. The projects at the Lynden and Sumas LPOEs are analyzed jointly in the Draft EIS due to their proximity (approximately 10 miles) to one another. Operational changes at one of the LPOEs could have impacts on the other LPOE, especially during construction. The Draft EIS examines the impacts on human, natural, and cultural resources from potential improvements at the LPOEs, including site expansion, demolition, and new construction.

The purpose of these projects is for GSA to support the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's Customs and Border Protection (CBP) mission through modernizing and expanding the Lynden and Sumas LPOEs. Accomplishing this purpose would increase the functionality, capacity, operational efficiency, effectiveness, security, sustainability, and safety of the Lynden and Sumas LPOEs.

The Draft EIS considers two action alternatives for the Lynden LPOE, three action alternatives for the Sumas LPOE, and a "no action" alternative for each LPOE. The "no action" alternative assumes that GSA would not expand or modernize the Lynden or Sumas LPOEs and that operations would continue under the current conditions.

At the Lynden LPOE, GSA proposes to construct a Main Building and Head House, a non-intrusive inspection building, commercial inspection yard, inspection booths/canopies, staff/visitor parking, inbound and outbound inspection areas, and utility facilities, as needed. The two action alternatives differ in the direction of the LPOE expansion and the maximum proposed limit of disturbance. The option to expand the LPOE to the west and east would disturb a maximum area of approximately 14.5 acres. The other action alternative would expand the LPOE to the north and south and would impact a maximum of approximately 10.3 acres.

At the Sumas LPOE, GSA proposes to construct a Main Building, a non-intrusive inspection building, inspection booths/canopies, inbound and outbound inspection areas, hazardous materials and agriculture inspection platforms, stormwater detention area, outdoor parking and staging areas, and utility facilities, as needed. The three action alternatives differ in the potential siting of inspection facilities and construction



of a single or multi-story port building. The proposed maximum extent of disturbance under any of the Sumas action alternatives is approximately 12.9 acres.

Two construction sequencing options were considered in the Draft EIS; these options are independent of the action alternatives and could be implemented with any of the action alternatives. Under the Concurrent Construction option, both ports would remain open during construction. Under the Sequential Construction option, GSA and CBP are considering the potential for a temporary closure of the Lynden LPOE. Additional details on the alternatives and the construction sequencing options being considered are provided in the Draft EIS.

The Draft EIS addresses the potential environmental impacts of the proposed alternatives on environmental resources including land use; water resources; biological resources; geology, topography, and soils; air quality, climate change, and greenhouse gases; human health and safety; infrastructure and utilities; traffic and transportation; noise and vibration; socioeconomics; and environmental justice and protection of children's health and safety. Based on the analysis presented in the Draft EIS, impacts to all resource areas would be less than significant (i.e., negligible, minor, or moderate). Impact reduction measures are presented in the Draft EIS to reduce potential adverse effects.

The Sumas LPOE project area is located within the 1-percent-annual-chance floodplain (also referred to as the base flood or 100-year flood) and 0.2-percent-annual-chance floodplain (also referred to as the 500-year flood). In compliance with Executive Order 11988 (Floodplain Management), GSA prepared a Floodplain Assessment and Statement of Findings, addressing potential impacts on floodplains, which is included in the Draft EIS for public review and comment. As described in the Draft EIS, GSA would follow federal, state, and local regulatory compliance requirements and incorporate design standards at the Sumas LPOE to minimize impacts to floodplains.

The public is encouraged to attend and participate in an in-person, open house public hearing to be held on September 4, 2024, from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m. PT. The purpose of this hearing is to present the findings of the Draft EIS to the public and to solicit feedback on the analysis. The hearing will be held at the American Legion Post 212 building at 134 Harrison St, Sumas, WA, 98295.
